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<u>Forward</u>

It is with great reluctance that I write this forward. I believe the words of these men and women stand completely on their own.

However, as a civilian, I would like to say something.

There is a mystery to most of us about the military. Sometimes it seems silent; at other times it seems menacing; and still other times, it moves us to tears.

That mysterious silence about the military really isn't that hard to understand. While we are rushing from fad to fad, eating fast food, watching 30 second commercials, 5 minute music videos, using lightning fast modems, driving faster cars, keeping tighter schedules...while we live this fast paced American life, the soldiers of our military sit quietly in the background, protecting us. They never sell themselves out to the media. They simply do not have to. And their example in maintaining their integrity is one that we should take note of.

They also endure cutting words from protesters; low pay, months away from their families, harsh elements, disrespect from teenagers, and much more. They, once again, do this silently and with tolerance.

We, as Americans, have a responsibility to support our military. Our freedoms and rights; the \$200,000 home, the job, the schools, your car, video games, coffee shops, the newspapers we read...ALL of it can be taken away. If we want all of our "things" and all of our "rights" to be protected, then we have to step up to the plate.

After 9/11, we had a renewed sense of patriotism. We suddenly understood that our firefighters, policemen and EMTs were heroes. And we cheered as our soldiers went off to battle evil. We, hopefully, learned a lesson on that day...one that I hope we never forget.

The job these soldiers do is not pretty. They are trained to desensitize themselves to the enemy in order to be able to kill. They use rough language and politically incorrect terms in that effort to desensitize. But they are not monsters. They are insightful, sensitive, caring and, sometimes, even a little emotional. They do not relish the thought of killing. What they relish is the thought of protecting, of attacking evil, of driving off those who wish to do their country harm. And it is NOT pretty or sexy. It is simply what HAS to be done.

We must always remember that even after the patriotic songs begin to grow quiet, even as the flags start to come down, even as we become complacent again...even then, our soldiers will STILL be there. They allow us to become comfortable; to relax; to feel secure and safe. They also allow us the right to speak our minds, to protest, and to disagree.

You can hate what these men and women HAVE to do to protect you, but we can never stop supporting and loving our soldiers.

After all, they loved us enough to be there.

Oklahoma city, the US embassies in Africa, the 1983 bombing of the Marine barracks, they all look the same: Rubble and confusion and fire. More confusion and conflicting reports from the pentagon. A bomb here. Another there. This one's a hoax, that one's not. We'd seen it all before. Not as bad, not by a long shot, but something to be mourned.

Then the cameras stopped showing the file footage of the buildings collapsing, the endless repeats of the airliner smashing into the tower over and over like some computer game. They shut it off for just a minute, and went live.

And what did they show?

F-15's flying. U.S. Air Force fighter planes flying Combat Air Patrols over New York City.

Think about that. U.S. Planes are flying Combat Air Patrols over the United States' biggest city.

Even in WWII, when Japanese balloon bombs started forest fires in the West and killed a few people, even when U-boats were sinking merchant ships within sight of the New Jersey beaches, we never had to fly CAP over New York City.

When I saw those planes flying over the city, I lost it. I wept.

Letter received from Hossra

March 10, 2002

Like all, I was shocked by the first plane attack and enraged/scared for my friends and colleagues after the second and third plane attack. I had a friend of mine who was a DoD law enforcement officer drive me as fast as possible back to the Pentagon. I could not contact anyone at my Office or my wife because all the phone lines into and outside D.C. were out.

We got to the Beltway where all traffic into D.C. was blocked. Thank God my friend was a law enforcement officer -- he got us through three blockades. When, however, we reached about a mile from the Pentagon, his badge could not get us through so I showed my DoD Badge and business card (showing that I was with DoD SpecOps), and convinced a cop to let me run to the Pentagon.

When I got there, I found a lot of tense, heavily armed guards for the SECDEF at the River Entrance. After (slowly) pulling out my ID, they let me in. Inside was SURREAL.

I could not see my hands for all the smoke. Few people were in the building. My first thought was to try to make it to my Office since the pictures on TV made it clear that, if my Office was not completely destroyed, it sure was damaged. I was worried about my colleagues and, afterwards, wanted to get to the Ops Center to help. I don't know why except to say that, as a paratrooper, I wanted to run TO the center of the fight and chaos NOT away. My wife and (leg) friends STILL do not understand that. :)

When I made it to my Office (or what was left of it), I was shocked. The damage, the smoke and, yes, the loss of life, was something that I will never forget.

I went to the center of the Pentagon, a 5-acre open space commonly and darkly referred to as "Ground Zero". I will never forget seeing that. Dozens of injured being treated by the most professional, cool medics, service members and civilians. Enlisted giving cool, calm orders to Officers (even a General) to help -- "hold that IV", "put that person over there". No complaints about rank -- just getting the job done.

When, after several hours, I went back outside the Pentagon, I was struck by the SILENCE. No traffic from I-395 or other roads. No airplanes AT ALL.

Suddenly, we were all yelled at by armed soldiers to get the hell away from the Pentagon. There was a report of another incoming plane (later, it turned out to be a news helicopter). I will never forget the cheers that rang out when, suddenly, an F-16 roared overhead. Like a lion protecting her cubs. I still get choked up about that memory.

Anyway, (I had finally gotten through to my wife, made sure that she and our son were in the house and safe), I took the Metro home and spent hours calling my staff, my friends and family to find out if all were OK and to let them know that I was safe.

I then got onto Paratrooper.net. I am not ashamed to say that that was one of the times that I cried. To see the messages of concern from my BROTHERS -- people

who may not have met me in person, but cared about me. That feeling of brotherhood, comradeship -- it does not exist ANYWHERE else in the world. I let my brothers know that I was OK -- but I can tell you that from then on, working on helping in this global war on terrorism has been easy knowing that we -- all of us -- are in this together.

THANK YOU PARATROOPERS -- FOR BEING THE BEST OF WHAT AMERICA STANDS FOR. I AM HONORED TO COUNT YOU AS MY BROTHERS AND SISTERS.

My name is Usman Farman and I graduated from Bentley with a Finance degree last May. I am 21 years old, turning 22 in October; I am Pakistani, and I am Muslim. Until September 10th 2001, I used to work at the World Trade Center in building #7. I had friends and acquaintances who worked in tower #1 right across from me. Some made it out, and some are still unaccounted for. I survived this horrible event.

I'd like to share with you what I went through that awful day, with the hopes that we can all stay strong together; through this tragedy of yet untold proportions. As I found out, regardless of who we are, and where we come from, we only have each other.

I commute into the city every morning on the train from New Jersey. Rather, I used to. I still can't believe what is happening. That morning I woke up and crawled out of bed. I was thinking about flaking out on the train and catching the late one, I remember telling myself that I just had to get to work on time. I ended up catching the 7:48 train, which put me in Hoboken at 8:20 am. When I got there I thought about getting something to eat, I decided against it and took the PATH train to the World Trade Center. I arrived at the World Trade at 8:40 in the morning. I walked into the lobby of building 7 at 8:45, that's when the first plane hit.

Had I taken the late train, or gotten a bite to eat, I would have been 5 minutes late and walking over the crosswalk. Had that happened, I would have been caught under a rain of fire and debris, I wouldn't be here talking to you. I'd be dead.

I was in the lobby, and I heard the first explosion; it didn't register. They were doing construction outside and I thought some scaffolding had fallen. I took the elevators up to my office on the 27th floor. When I walked in, the whole place was empty. There were no alarms, no sprinklers, nothing. Our offices are, or rather, were on the south side of building seven. We were close enough to the North and South Towers, that I could literally throw a stone from my window and hit the North tower with it.

My phone rang and I spoke with my mother and told her that I was leaving, at that moment I saw an explosion rip out of the second building. I called my friend in Boston, waking her up and told her to tell everyone I'm okay, and that I was leaving. I looked down one last time and saw the square and fountain that I eat lunch in, was covered in smoldering debris. Apparently, I was one of the last to leave my building, when I was on the way up in the elevators; my co-workers from the office were in the stairwells coming down. When I evacuated, there was no panic. People were calm and helping each other; a pregnant woman was being carried down the stairwell.

I'll spare the more gruesome details of what I saw, those are things that no one should ever have to see, and beyond human decency to describe. Those are things

which will haunt me for the rest of my life, my heart goes out to everyone who lost their lives that day, and those who survived with the painful reminders of what once was. Acquaintances of mine who made it out of the towers, only got out because 1000 people formed a human chain to find their way out of the smoke. Everyone was a hero that day.

We were evacuated to the north side of building 7. Still only 1 block from the towers. The security people told us to go north and not to look back. 5 city blocks later I stopped and turned around to watch. With a thousand people staring, we saw in shock as the first tower collapsed. No one could believe it was happening, it is still all too surreal to imagine. The next thing I remember is that a dark cloud of glass and debris about 50 stories high came tumbling towards us. I turned around and ran as fast as possible. I didn't realize until yesterday that the reason I'm still feeling so sore was that I fell down trying to get away. What happened next is why I came here to give this speech.

I was on my back, facing this massive cloud that was approaching, it must have been 600 feet off, everything was already dark. I normally wear a pendant around my neck, inscribed with an Arabic prayer for safety; similar to the cross. A Hasidic Jewish man came up to me and held the pendant in his hand, and looked at it. He read the Arabic out loud for a second. What he said next, I will never forget. With a deep Brooklyn accent he said "Brother, if you don't mind, there is a cloud of glass coming at us, grab my hand, lets get the hell out of here". He helped me stand up, and we ran for what seemed like forever without looking back. He was the last person I would ever have thought, who would help me. If it weren't for him, I probably would have been engulfed in shattered glass and debris.

I finally stopped about 20 blocks away, and looked in horror as tower #2 came crashing down. Fear came over me as I realized that some people were evacuated to the streets below the towers. Like I said before, no one could have thought those buildings could collapse. We turned around and in shock and disbelief and began the trek to midtown. It took me 3 hours to get to my sisters office at 3 avenue and 47th street. Some streets were completely deserted, completely quiet, no cars, no nothing... just the distant wail of sirens. I managed to call home and say I was okay, and get in touch with co-workers and friends whom I feared were lost.

We managed to get a ride to New Jersey. Looking back as I crossed the George Washington Bridge, I could not see the towers. It had really happened.

As the world continues to reel from this tragedy, people in the streets are lashing out. Not far from my home, a Pakistani woman was run over on purpose as she was crossing the parking lot to put groceries in her car. Her only fault? That she had her head covered and was wearing the traditional clothing of my homeland. I am afraid for my family's well being within our community. My older sister is too scared to take the subway into work now. My 8-year-old sister's school is under lockdown and armed watch by police.

Violence only begets violence, and by lashing out at each other in fear and hatred, we will become no better than the faceless cowards who committed this atrocity. If it weren't for that man who helped me get up, I would most likely be in the hospital right now, if not dead. Help came from the least expected place, and goes only to show, that we are all in this together ... regardless of race, religion, or ethnicity. Those are principles that this country was founded on.

Please take a moment to look at the people sitting around you. Friends or strangers, in a time of crisis, you would want the nearest person to help you if you needed it. My help came from a man who I would never have thought would normally even speak to me. Ask yourselves now how you can help those people in New York and Washington. You can donate blood, you can send clothing, food, and money. Funds have been setup in the New York area to help the families of fallen firefighters, policemen, and emergency personnel. The one thing that won't help, is if we fight amongst ourselves, because it is then that we are doing exactly what they want us to do, and I know that nobody here wants to do that.

"The US yesterday mobilized support from Britain and its other western allies for a crusade against Islamic terrorism in the wake of Tuesday's devastating terrorist attacks on New York and Washington in which thousands of people died. For the first time in its 52-year history, Nato last night invoked Article 5 of its charter, which declares that an attack on any member state is an attack on all, implying automatic European backing for US retaliation.

Nato is now drawing up an emergency plan for a massive attack on Afghanistan if proof emerges that Osama bin Laden, the wanted Saudi-born terrorist sheltered by Afghanistan, was responsible for the attacks.

US justice department officials said yesterday that there was a growing body of evidence pointing towards his involvement. However, many US experts on terrorism, including the former CIA director, James Woolsey, and the former Nato commander in Europe, Wesley Clark, said they believed that Tuesday's terrorist operation also had state sponsorship, and mentioned Iraq as a suspect.

US defense officials stressed that the culprits would be punished. "We have a very large hammer that can be brought to bear in a number of ways at any time," one official said. "That's not a threat, it's a fact."

By invoking Article 5, Nato has committed each member to take "such action as it deems necessary, including the use of armed force, to restore and maintain the security of the North Atlantic area".

Investigators believe that four separate cells were involved in the hijackings, including trained pilots who had learned their skills at private flying schools in the US.

Nato's historic move came amid reports that the intended targets for one of the hijacked aircraft were the White House and the presidential aircraft, Air Force One.

The ruling Taliban government in Afghanistan will now come under intensive pressure from Washington to hand over Bin Laden or face the consequences. Until now the Taliban has steadfastly refused to extradite him.

Under contingency plans being prepared, an assault would involve tens of thousands of ground troops, equivalent to the scale of the force deployed in Kosovo, Nato defense sources said last night.

Such a taskforce, which might take weeks to assemble, would not preclude an initial US cruise missile attack, they said. The Nato sources said any multinational offensive would almost certainly involve British forces. It would also require the active support of Russia.

President George Bush warned Americans that they faced a long, hard struggle against their terrorist enemies, but promised that the country would not stand-alone. He promised to "rally the world. We will be patient. We'll be focused, and we will be steadfast in our determination," he said. "This battle will take time and resolve, but make no mistake about it, we will win."

Colin Powell, the US secretary of state, said that Washington wanted to build a "global coalition" to fight terrorism that would include not only Nato and Russia, but also China and Muslim states.

Mr. Bush spoke to Tony Blair during the day, and indicated there would be no kneejerk reaction. *Mr.* Blair and *Mr.* Bush concurred that the vital thing was to move forward together in a united action."

"America: The Good Neighbor."

Widespread, but only partial news coverage was given recently to a remarkable editorial broadcast from Toronto by Gordon Sinclair, a Canadian television commentator. What follows is the full text of his trenchant remarks as printed in the <u>Congressional Record</u>:

"This Canadian thinks it is time to speak up for the Americans as the most generous and possibly the least appreciated people on all the earth. Germany, Japan and, to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave other billions in debts. None of these countries is today paying even the interest on its remaining debts to the United States.

When France was in danger of collapsing in 1956, it was the Americans who propped it up, and their reward was to be insulted and swindled on the streets of Paris. I was there. I saw it.

When earthquakes hit distant cities, it is the United States that hurries in to help. This spring, 59 American communities were flattened by tornadoes. Nobody helped.

The Marshall Plan and the Truman Policy pumped billions of dollars into discouraged countries. Now newspapers in those countries are writing about the decadent, warmongering Americans.

I'd like to see just one of those countries that is gloating over the erosion of the United States dollar build its own airplane. Does any other country in the world have a plane to equal the Boeing Jumbo Jet, the Lockheed Tri-Star, or the Douglas DC10? If so, why don't they fly them? Why do all the International lines except Russia fly American Planes? Why does no other land on earth even consider putting a man or woman on the moon? You talk about Japanese technocracy, and you get radios. You talk about German technocracy, and you get automobiles. And when they do, they are entitled to thumb their nose at the lands that are gloating over their present troubles. I hope Canada is not one of those.¹²

1.Two U.S. C-130 aircraft landed at a Russian military airport near Uzbekistan's capital city of Tashkent on Saturday.

An unspecified source in Tashkent has told the Interfax news agency that the aircraft brought various technical equipment, including reconnaissance facilities, and about 100 U.S. servicemen. One plane left Uzbekistan after unloading.

2.Russian Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov said on Wednesday Moscow agreed that force may be needed to wage Washington's "war on terrorism", but it had not been asked for military support. Speaking during a day of talks with U.S. officials, Ivanov went to great lengths to stress Russia's readiness to cooperate in the U.S. "war on terrorism."

"We have to give up the stereotypes of the Cold War. The time has come to take a new, decisive step and start building a strategic relationship," he said at a dinner.

Ivanov said the United States had not raised the question of military assistance from Russia, or use of military bases in Central Asian states on former Soviet territory. But that Russia will provide any help to US including military.

Russia is potentially a key military ally if Washington decides to attack Afghanistan, where Osama bin Laden is based.

U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell said he and Ivanov had discussed potential cooperation areas like "law enforcement, military activity, legal actions, financial actions – anything that can be used to get at these terrorist organizations."

He said he was referring first of all to al Qaeda, a network of guerrilla cells led by bin Laden, a Saudi-born militant accused of masterminding the attacks in which hijackers smashed planes into two World Trade Center towers in New York and the Pentagon near Washington. Another hijacked plane crashed in Pennsylvania.

Aside from its military might, Moscow also has knowledge of Afghanistan, including intelligence, from the war it fought and lost to U.S.-backed Islamic militants, including bin Laden.

Ivanov said U.S. cooperation with Russia, which has its own guerrilla war to fight in Chechnya, was ongoing and their special services were in constant contact.

Russia has an interest in exchanging intelligence information on bin Laden, believing that the Muslim separatists fighting in Chechnya also have links to his organization.

Additionally, last week the Russian General Prosecutor announced that his agency had passed a large amount of documentation to the US special services, which according to the Prosecutor's office, contained "conclusive evidence" of contacts between the Chechen separatists and bin Laden and the Taliban. Perhaps the US special services have now had time to digest those documents and have been swayed.

Green Berets still embrace 40-year-old prayer

By Mike Foley The Greenville (S.C.) News

Army Special Forces soldiers battling in Afghanistan are equipped with the most modern weaponry and support known to mankind. They also have support of a different kind: the Special Forces Prayer penned 40 years ago by an Army chaplain four years after his graduation from Bob Jones University in Greenville, S.C.

In 1961, as Green Berets from Fort Bragg, N.C., were about to be sent to Laos to train the Royal Laotian army to fight communists, Chaplain John Stevey was asked to write a prayer for the men.

Gen. William Yarborough, then-commanding officer of the Special Forces, told Stevey that he wanted to remind the soldiers of the spiritual nature of their work.

"But I had to write it so that it could be used by many faiths," Stevey recalls. "He wanted it made so it could be put on a card in men's wallets."

Stevey came up with a prayer that makes no mention of Jesus, but succinctly captures the spirit — and the spirituality — of the men and women of the Special Forces. In the four decades since its birth, the prayer has become a part of the culture of the elite group of Army warriors.

"It is very much a part of who Special Forces are. It's part of our heritage, part of what we are," says Col. Paul Vicalvi, command chaplain of Army Special Forces at Fort Bragg.

What started as a prayer on a wallet card soon became ingrained into the Special Forces community. At the conclusion of Special Forces training, soldiers are feted at a regimental dinner. Along with being outfitted with their Green Berets, they receive a copy of the Special Forces Prayer.

The prayer is etched into a large stained glass window above the entryway at JFK Memorial Chapel at Fort Bragg. It's included in special Bibles issued to all Special Forces troops. It has been set to music and pressed into records. And today, with the Army's blessing, it can even be found on a variety of T-shirts and sweatshirts.

"It kind of blows my mind," says Stevey, now 70, a native of Greensburg, Pa.

While Stevey was earning bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees during the 1950s at Bob Jones University, he took a commission in the Army Reserve. After he graduated in 1957, he applied for active duty. Two months later, he was an Army chaplain.

He served in Panama and more than a dozen other stops in 22 years, including six years of parachute duty and four years as a Green Beret. He retired in 1977. Unbeknownst to Stevey, a stained-glass window emblazoned with his prayer was installed in the Special Forces chapel while he was serving overseas.

While attending a funeral in Dayton, Ohio several years ago, the senior chaplain at the Veterans Affairs Medical Center there asked him to come back and serve as a chaplain at the center. So he came out of retirement.

During his careers, Stevey has had an influence on many lives. But he'll never know how many people he's affected with his simple prayer.

People such as retired Lt. Col. Bob Huckabee, who has a framed copy of the prayer hanging on the wall above his desk in a Seneca (S.C.) High School classroom where he teaches Junior ROTC. He bought a copy of the prayer at the JFK Special Warfare Museum Gift Shop at Fort Bragg.

"You would see it in team rooms, headquarters ... and anywhere you see special ops and Special Forces people serving," Huckabee says. "It's followed me everywhere I've been — and now into retirement."

Special Forces Prayer

Almighty God, who art the Author of liberty and the Champion of the oppressed, hear our prayer.

We, the men of Special Forces, acknowledge our dependence upon Thee in the preservation of human freedom.

So with us as we seek to defend the defenseless and to free the enslaved.

May we ever remember that our nation, whose motto is "In God We Trust," expects that we shall acquit ourselves with honor, that we may never bring shame among our faith, our families, or our fellow men.

Grant us wisdom from Thy mind, courage from Thine heart, strength from Thine arm, and protection by Thine hand.

It is for Thee that we do battle, and to Thee belongs the victor's crown. For Thine is the kingdom, and the power and glory, forever.

U.S. HUMANITARIAN RELIEF MISSION TO AFGHANISTAN

Secretary of Defense Donald H. Rumsfeld announced today that at 9:30 p.m. EDT, two U.S. Air Force C -17 aircraft finished an airdrop of enough daily rations for 37,500 people in the regions of Afghanistan where displaced persons are at risk of starvation.

"This is just the first installment of the President's pledge of \$320 million of assistance to the people of Afghanistan," said Rumsfeld.

This airdrop will assist the Afghan people who are coping with the growing humanitarian crisis. The President has instructed the Defense Department to provide food through all available means into regions where displaced persons risk starvation.

The total includes \$25 million authorized on September 28 by the President from the Emergency Refugee and Migration Assistance Fund to provide assistance to a potentially large number of refugees who could cross from Afghanistan into surrounding countries, including Pakistan, Iran, Tajikistan, Uzbekistan and Turkmenistan.

Additional assistance totaling \$295 million will be provided through United Nations assistance agencies, the International Committee of the Red Cross, non-governmental organizations, and through direct provision of food and relief supplies.

The U.S. is Afghanistan's largest aid donor, with more than \$170 million already this year. The U.S. and other countries have provided food, shelter, jobs and health clinics for needy Afghans.

STATEMENT OF THE SECRETARY OF DEFENSE Secretary of Defense Donald H. Rumsfeld released today the following statement:

"Good afternoon. We have said since September 11 that the campaign against terrorism will be broad, sustained, and that we will use every element of American influence. Today, the president has turned to direct, overt military force to complement the economic, humanitarian, financial, and diplomatic activity already well underway. "The effect we hope to achieve through the raids, which, together with our coalition partners, we have initiated today, is to create conditions for sustained anti-terrorist and humanitarian relief operations in Afghanistan. That requires that, among other things, we first remove the threat from air

defenses and from Taliban aircraft. "We also seek to raise the cost of doing business for foreign terrorists who have chosen Afghanistan from which to organize their activities, and for the oppressive Taliban regime that continues to tolerate the terrorist presence in those portions of Afghanistan they control. "The current military operations are focused on achieving several outcomes. To: "Make it clear to the Taliban leaders and their supporters that harboring terrorists is unacceptable and carries a price. "Acquire intelligence to facilitate future operations against AI Qaida and the Taliban regimes who harbor the terrorists. "Develop relationships with groups in Afghanistan that oppose the Taliban regime and the foreign terrorists they support. "Make it increasingly difficult for the terrorists to use Afghanistan freely as a base of operations. "Alter the military balance over time, by denying to the Taliban its offensive systems that hamper the progress of the various opposition forces.

"Provide humanitarian relief to Afghans suffering truly oppressive living conditions. "I want to reiterate a point President Bush has made often and that he made again today. The United States has organized armed coalitions on several occasions since the Cold War for the purpose of denying hostile regimes the opportunity to oppress their own or other people.

"In Kuwait, Northern Iraq, Somalia, Bosnia, and Kosovo, the United States took action on behalf of Muslim populations against outside invaders or oppressive regimes. The same is true today. We stand with those Afghans who are being repressed by a regime that abuses the very people it purports to lead and harbors terrorists who have attacked and killed thousands of innocent people around the world-of all religions, races and nationalities.

"While our raids today focus on the Taliban and the foreign terrorists in Afghanistan, our aim remains much broader. Our objective is to defeat those who use terrorism, and those that house or support them.

"The world stands united in this effort. It is not about a religion, an individual terrorist, or a country. Our partners in this effort represent nations and peoples of all cultures, religions, and races.

"We share the belief that terrorism is a cancer on the human condition, and we intend to oppose it wherever it is. "The operation today involved a variety of weapons systems, and it originated from a number of separate locations. We used land and sea based aircraft, surface ships and submarines, and employed a variety of weapons to achieve our objectives. "As President Bush mentioned in his statement, dozens of countries contributed in specific ways to this mission, including transit and landing rights, basing opportunities, and intelligence support. In this mission, we are particularly grateful for the direct military involvement of forces from Great Britain.

"To achieve the outcomes we seek, it is important to go after air defense and Taliban aircraft. We need freedom to operate on the ground and in the air, and the targets selected, if successfully destroyed, should permit an increasing degree of freedom over time.

"We have also targeted command facilities for those forces we know support terrorist elements within Afghanistan, and critical terrorist sites.

"As President Bush has repeatedly emphasized, we will hold accountable any who help terrorists, as well as the terrorists themselves."

JDAM MISSES INTENDED TARGET IN AFGHANISTAN At approximately 6:30 p.m. EDT yesterday (Oct. 12), a U.S. Navy F/A-18 Hornet missed its intended target and inadvertently dropped a 2000-pound GPS-guided Joint Direct Attack Munition (JDAM) in a residential area near Kabul Airport, Afghanistan. The intended target was a military helicopter at Kabul Airport, approximately one mile from the residential area.

We regret the loss of any civilian life. U.S. forces are intentionally striking only military and terrorist targets. They take great care in their targeting process to avoid civilian casualties. We have no accurate way of estimating the number of casualties, but reports from the ground indicate there may have been four deaths and eight injured.

Although details are being investigated and may take several days, preliminary indications are that the accident occurred from a targeting process error.
